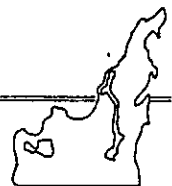

Oscar E. Dame, 75, a retired lighthouse keeper and a lifelong resident of Northport, died at his home in Northport Monday evening following a brief illness.

Mr. Dame, a veteran of 22 years in the lighthouse service, retired in 1928 after serving for 21 years at the Fox Island light, 21 years

at the Grand Traverse light and three years at Keweenaw, Wis.

He is survived by his wife, Ella and three children, William, George and Northport, and one brother, James, also of Northport.

The body was taken to the Meriton funeral home in Suttons Bay to remain until Thursday noon when it will be taken to the Northport Methodist church, where it will lie in state until time of funeral services at 2:30. Rev. John Gerlach will officiate and burial will be made in the family lot in Northport cemetery.

WASHINGTON, May 4—(AP)—

Senator Charles A. McNair of the house foreign affairs committee said today that if Russia is permitted to take Greece and Turkey, her next steps would be Iran, Afghanistan, India and China.

And the Communists already are advancing on the Greek and Turkish borders, the New Jersey Republican said in opening general house debate on the \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid bill. He urged the house to join the senate in approving it.

McNair acknowledged that the bill and its stop-Communism principles

involved "great risks" and "greater risks."

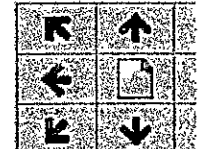

Lila Hagen Awarded U. of M. Scholarship

Names of the 366 Michigan high school graduates who will receive University of Michigan Regents-Alumni Scholarships for 1947-48 have been announced by Erich A. Walter, director of the Office of Student Affairs and chairman of the scholarship committee.

The scholarships are provided by the University to help in the development of leadership and productive citizenship in all parts of the state. High scholarship, leadership qualifications and a real desire to acquire a University education are the major factors considered by the scholarship committee in making the awards.

"The Regents-Alumni Scholarships provide for payment of semester fees for the freshman year at the University," Walter said. "Successful scholarship performance will permit renewal of the scholarship through the sophomore, junior and senior years."

He expressed the appreciation of the Committee and the University for the work of the local school officials and the 70 University of Michigan alumni clubs in helping to select the scholarship candidates.

"It is particularly satisfying to note that many of the students honored by the University this year for high scholastic achievement were Regents-Alumni scholars," Walter declared. "It is becoming evident that a greater number of high schools are taking a very serious interest in encouraging their students to compete for the Regents-Alumni Scholarships."

He emphasized that at least one scholarship is available for every accredited high school in the state.

On the floor of the House, he confessed that he had been on the verge of introducing a resolution to ask the conservation department why the state was permitting the Moral Re-armament group to occupy the Island House, state-owned hotel on Mackinac Island, for a nominal fee.

Taking the census for Uncle Sam is going to be a full time job for dozens of persons when April 1 rolls around. It will pay the average worker about eight dollars a day and the job will last a month longer in a rural county than in cities because of the distances.

Workers hereabouts will undoubtedly be chosen by the newly reorganized Democratic county committee. They must be between 21 and 65 years old, with the lower ages getting the preference.

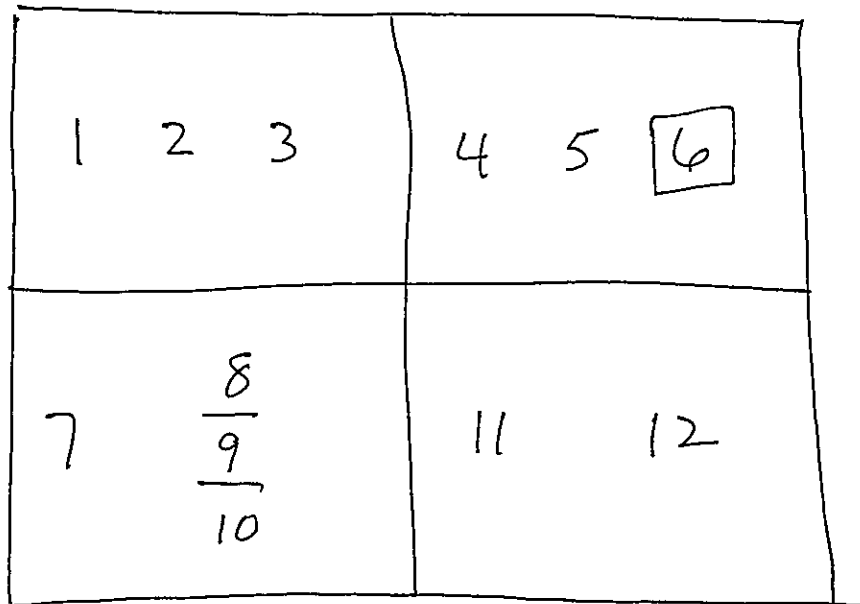

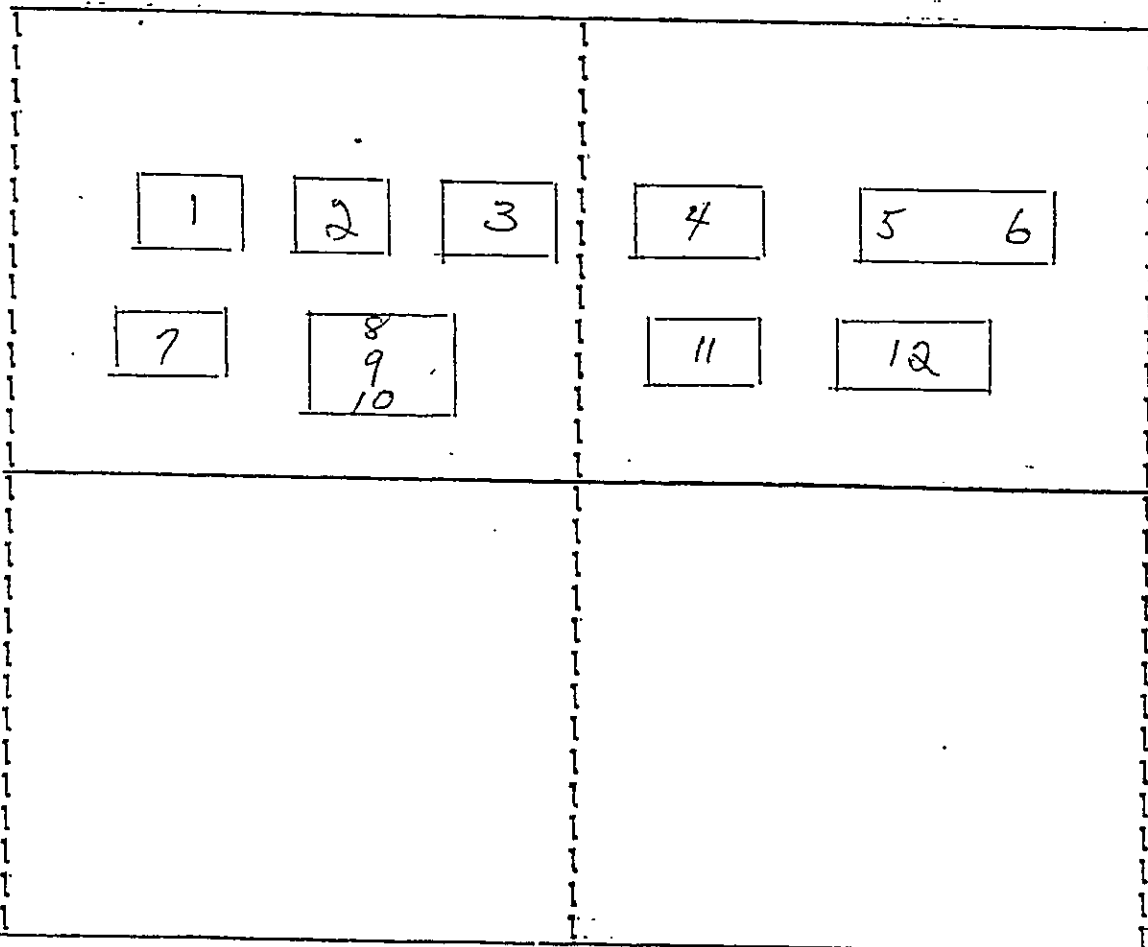
