Dame, had been absent without leave since August 1st, and that the third assistant, Edward Graves, had left the island on August 8th, by permission of the first assistant, having been sent for on account of the confinement of his wife.

2. The third assistant, upon arrival at Northport, Mich., sent a substitute to take his place, notified the second assistant, Dame, of the necessity of his leaving the island, and requested Dame to return, which Dame failed to do until August 12th.

3. From my investigation I am convinced that the keeper did not grant extended leave to the second assistant, Dame, who was therefore absent with-


out leave from August 1st to August 12th, and that he failed to return to his station when notified that his presence was urgently needed. For this reason I have to recommend that Oscar E. Dame, second assistant at South Fox Island Light-Station, Mich., be removed for cause, believing that the public service will be materially improved by his removal.

4. Mr. Dame has been suspended from duty effective on September 15, 1910, pending the disposition of his case; I therefore recommend that his removal be made effective at the close of September 15th. A copy of this letter has been forwarded to him.

5. It is recommended that no further action be taken in the case of the keeper, first assistant keeper, and third assistant keeper.

6. Written statements from each are forwarded herewith.

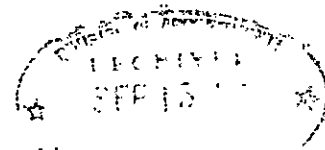

MEMORANDUM IN RE DISMISSAL OF OSCAR E. DAME, SECOND ASSISTANT KEEPER OF SOUTH FOX ISLAND LIGHT-STATION, MICHIGAN.

There is attached hereto a letter dated the 14th instant (with enclosures) from the Bureau of Light-Houses, recommending that the Department approve the Inspector's course in suspending Mr. Oscar E. Dame from duty effective September 15. and that he be dismissed from the service effective at the close of the same date.

The correspondence transmitted with the Bureau's letter discloses the following information:

The keeper states that he granted second assistant keeper Dame leave to go and see a banker about some money that was supposed to be in danger of being lost unless looked after at once, but that the length of such leave was not specified; also that he told Dame, after the Inspector left the station on August 12, that he (the keeper) got himself in hot water by letting him go.

The statement of the first assistant keeper does not throw any light on the case other than to show that Dame and the keeper left the station at 9.45 a. m. on August 1, and that they returned at 11.10 a. m. on August 12.

The third assistant keeper states that he was called to Northport, Michigan, on account of the illness of his wife, and that while there he met Dame and requested him to return to the station, this request being made on the 10th of August; that Dame consented to return to the station, but an hour later, on the same day, he stated that he would not go until the return of the keeper.

With respect to the charges filed against him, Mr. Dame states that he was granted leave of absence by the keeper; that he would have returned to the station as requested by the third assistant keeper but for the fact that the last named employee had sent the boat to the station; and that he returned to the station with the keeper the next morning.

In recommending second assistant keeper Dame's dismissal the Inspector states that from his investigation he is convinced that the keeper did not grant extended leave of absence to second assistant keeper Dame; that Dame was absent from duty without leave from August 1 to August 12; and that he failed to return to his station when notified that his presence was urgently needed.

From the correspondence submitted it does not appear that the first and second specifications of the Inspector's charges, as set forth above, have been sustained, as the keeper clearly admits that he granted Dame leave of absence. At the most, Dame could only be guilty of not returning to duty at the earliest practicable date after being requested so to do by the third assistant, and this specification does not appear to be clearly established.

After going carefully into the matter I feel that the charges filed against Dame have not been established in a degree sufficient to warrant his dismissal. It is possible, however, that he did not return to his station at the earliest practicable date after being re-

quested to do so by the third assistant keeper, and for that reason it would seem that the Inspector's course in suspending him from duty effective September 15 should be approved. In my opinion this will be sufficient punishment for any tardiness he may have shown in returning to his station, and I accordingly suggest that Dame be restored to duty upon the receipt of the Department's communication ordering the same, or as soon thereafter as he can report for duty.

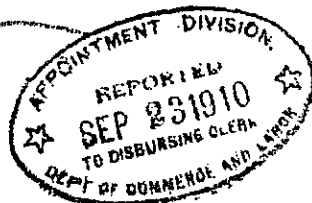

Receipt is acknowledged of the Bureau's letter of the 14th instant (with enclosures), relative to the charges preferred against Oscar E. Dame, second assistant keeper of South Fox Island Light-Station, Michigan.

After going carefully into the matter the Department is of opinion that the charges preferred against Mr. Dame have not been established in a degree sufficient to warrant his dismissal from the service. In his statement bearing upon the matter the keeper clearly admits that he granted leave of absence to Dame when he left the station. There is some doubt, however, whether Dame returned to the station at the earliest practicable date after having been requested to do so by the third assistant keeper, and for that reason the Department approves the Inspector's course in suspending him from duty effective September 15. The Department feels that this action will be sufficient punishment for any tardiness which Dame may have shown in returning to his station, and accordingly directs that he be restored to duty upon the receipt of this communication.
